Global Trade Jobs Pay Big

With to the proximity of Mexico and our local port, the San Diego region is a hub for global careers.

Due in part to the North American Free Trade Agreement (NAFTA), industry across the border into Tijuana is stronger than ever. Many goods are manufactured in Mexico, and then are imported into the United States. Other goods will be taken from Mexico, through Southern California to the Port of Long Beach where they are exported world wide.

Additionally, the Port of San

Diego is one of the biggest break -bulk Ports in the US, allowing for shipment of large or unusual items, like wind turbines or building materials which don't fit on shipping containers. Our local port brings in most of the Bananas for the western United States, as well as about 13% of the cars imported into the United States.

Both US and international companies have manufacturing facilities in Mexico, so a knowledge of global economics can be an amazing asset to secure a job.

Many positions require bilingual employees, making many of these positions ideal for locals

What are Logistics?

Moving goods across the globe is based on the field of logistics. Items are sourced or manufactured, then a supply chain must be established to transport those goods from the supplier to the intermediaries, the seller, and ultimately the customer. As are imported and exported, many tariffs and duties may apply depending on the type of good, and since goods aren't immediately shipped to the consumer, they are stored in warehouses until they are sold. Supply chain managers, business operations specialists, inspectors and cargo agents are all key players in the field of global logistics.

GEOGRAPHY

Make true connections between countries by tracing the origin of each component in an iPhone or their favorite jacket.

Identify historic trade routes and how they led to geographic discoveries.

SOCIAL SCIENCE

Look at Free Trade Agreements to gain a better understanding of trade influences and politics.

History is significantly driven by trade, as countries fought for new territories based on raw materials

ENGLISH

Have students work on business plans to get a better feel for how to use language in a professional environment. Practicing their "elevator pitch" is a great way to get them to be concise, present and communicate.

MATH

Taxes on imports and exports requires a strong understanding of math. Check out our math module on global trade and entrepreneurship.

Logistics is founded on math as well, from determining the mass a boat can handle to counting the number of items by weight.

SCIENCE

Mastering the balance between cargo, mass and buoyancy is key to keeping afloat. Improving manufacturing processes depends on a broad understanding of chemistry, and dealing with bilge water pumped into local waterways brings a biology focus.

LANGUAGE

The ability to speak a foreign language is a key component to international trade, and many programs require multiple languages. Cultural sensitivity may make or break your international business dealings, so that is an essential component to language education.
